## **Executive Summary**

- 1. This quarterly implementation progress report is meant to document the progress made during the quarter January March, 2013.
- Five meetings of the Grant Making Committee (GMC) were organized in connection with the evaluation of proposals and selection of CSOs for grant making for the 4<sup>th</sup> batch under MDTF/PFM window.
- 3. The Grant Management Committee (GMC) was oriented to the provisions of new fund for grant making under MDTF/PFM. They were informed that the programme intends to make some 34 grants under the theme of Public Financial Management (PFM) of which 4 would be large grants and 30 would small grants.
- 4. As part of the communication strategy, CECI website for PRAN http://www.ceci.ca/en/where-we-work/asia/nepal/pran/ has been updated and maintained. Besides, the progress were shared among different stakeholders on several occasions.
- 5. With the concurrence from PCU on the modified Guidelines for Applicants for small grants category, they were translated into Nepali language and the call for proposal was subsequently announced in mid-January.
- Likewise, updates and adjustments were made on the format for FPP and evaluation criteria in line with the proposed SA initiatives for National PFM; and was made available to the CSOs shortlisted for FPP submission.
- 7. This quarter accomplished a major milestone in grant making with the completion of the process of evaluation of PCNs/FPPs of both small and large grant categories. 3 CSOs were recommended by GMC for large grant on National PFM while 30 CSOs were recommended for small grants on PFM at VDC level.
- 8. The quarterly progress report for the period October December, 2012 along with the financial monitoring report was submitted to the TTL and was approved. Similarly, the withdrawal application was submitted to the World Bank and was approved by the TTL. Subsequently, the application for approved amount was submitted through the clientconnection; and the fund received in the Designated Account (DA).
- 9. CECI, together with other PRAN partners, continued to participate and share the progress in the Monthly Meetings as well as other occasional meetings organized by PCU and/other partners including the 3 day residential Way Forward Workshop in March. Besides, it also engaged in the consultative process led by the World Bank on refining the results indicators as well as the designing of next phase of the project for until December 2015 including the Impact Evaluation Framework for MDTF-PFM.
- 10. The major priority for the next quarter will be to complete the negotiation with the selected CSOs, contract signing and getting the Sub-grantees commence the implementation of their projects.
- 11. The expenditure during this period amounted to US\$ 23,232.86 and the closing balance at the designated account was US\$ 215,536.14. Net cash requirement projection for the next quarter amount to US\$ 106,433.86.

12. Some of the key challenges faced during this quarter included the delayed announcement of call for proposal for small grants, low turnout of applications for the large grants, and the determination of the issue of conflict of interest with respect to one of the applicants for national PFM.

## 1. Introduction

The Program for Accountability in Nepal (PRAN)¹ is a World Bank program to promote demand for good governance in Nepal. Financed by the State and Peace-building Fund (SPBF) – a Trust Fund at the World Bank -- for a period of over 3 years until December 2013, PRAN is being implemented in agreement with the Government of Nepal. PRAN's purpose is to improve governance and institutional performance in Nepal by promoting more accountable, honest, transparent and responsive government agencies delivering quality services. To this end, the PRAN aims to strengthen the capacity of civil society organizations and other non-state organizations, and that of the government officials, for constructive engagement for good governance through the effective use of social accountability approaches and tools. PRAN was set to support social accountability in three priority areas: a) Public Financial Management (PFM); b) Municipal Governance; and, c) Public Service Delivery.

In the context of the Government's priority to the public financial management reform in Nepal and in recognition of the importance of demand-side efforts in the form of social accountability initiatives towards attaining sustainable improvement in PFM, the Multi-Donor Trust Fund for Public Financial Management Reform in Nepal (MDTF-PFM) has provided fund to implement social accountability programs until June 2014 in the name of Strengthening Civil Society Organizations' Use of Social Accountability to Improve Public Financial Management in Nepal. Its development objective is to strengthen the transparency, efficiency and inclusiveness of public financial management in Nepal through fostering the use of different social accountability tools by Nepali CSOs. In order to support enhanced demand-side initiative in the theme of public financial management, the MDTF-PFM funding has adopted the overall program logic of PRAN as well as its architecture of program execution.

The PRAN is executed through five components designed to direct support towards knowledge and skill development in social accountability; piloting innovative social accountability initiatives and developing tools; networking of social accountability practitioners; monitoring and evaluating social accountability approaches and conducting research for learning; and program leadership and administration.

**Component 2** is a recipient-executed independent *Grant Making for Action Learning* facility. The Center for International Studies and Cooperation (CECI) was selected, through a competitive process, to execute this component as Grant Management Agency (GMA) for PRAN. Component 2 will continue for Grant Making under MDTF-PFM funding until June 2014.

The Grant Agreement for executing the component with the MDTF-PFM fund was signed on August 30, 2012 with immediate effect. This quarterly implementation progress report is the **third** for the program since then. It presents the progress made during **January – March**, **2013** which falls under the **third quarter** of the World Bank fiscal year **2012/13** (but the **fourth** quarter of CECI's fiscal year **2012/13**).

## 2. Brief Description of the Component

To execute the Component in the theme of Public Financial Management, CECI will receive a grant of \$800,000 from the World Bank. CECI will make grants to Nepali CSOs for action learning projects through two grant categories: a) large grants of up to US\$50,000 for piloting social accountability initiatives and, b) small grants of up to US\$15,000 for undertaking action research on development and testing of social accountability tools. Total budget available for this purpose is US\$ 650,000.

## 2.1 Objective

**Project Objectives and Description:** The objective of the Project is to strengthen the transparency, efficiency, and inclusiveness of three (3) specific areas of public financial management, namely, (i) national budget planning, dissemination, and analysis; (ii) local (district, municipal and village) budget planning, dissemination and analysis; and (iii) local monitoring of procurement, budget execution and service performance, in selected districts of Nepal through fostering the use of appropriate social accountability tools by Civil Society Organizations in Nepal.

## 2.2 Target sub-grantees of the action learning grant (ALG)

Nepali CSOs including NGOs, CBOs, professional associations, policy research and advocacy centers and independent media organizations constitute the population for PRAN support in general. Given the piloting nature/scale of the program and the limitation of the resource, and in view, therefore, of the necessity of close monitoring of the grant implementation, there is the need of being selective in coverage. The idea is to create a critical mass of skilled SA practitioners that will increase over time. It is in consideration of these factors that the coverage target for the present ALG has been defined as follows:

- a) Piloting social accountability initiative (PSAI): Considered a large grant in the context of the present program, this type of grant will be provided on a competitive basis to those CSOs that have prior experience in applying SA tools and intend to experiment/innovate with new approaches or refine/expand their current practices. Four grants will be provided under this category towards the first area mentioned above (national budget planning, dissemination, and analysis).
- b) Testing social accountability tools (TSAT): This small grant window, which is designed to support the development and testing of SA tools, is intended to support those CSOs who have received training in or exposure to a SAc tool through the PRAN and wish to adapt and apply that learning in the Nepal context. Thus, only those CSOs who have received training or exposure on SA under the training component of the PRAN will be eligible for receiving this grant. Some 30 grants will be provided under this category towards the second and third areas mentioned above (local budget planning, dissemination and analysis; and local monitoring of procurement, budget execution and service performance). Geographically, this category limits itself to selected ten districts (Bajura, Achham, Kailali, Kalikot, Rolpa, Jajarkot, Dang, Gorkha, Rolpa and Kapilvastu) spanning 3 development regions (Western, Mid-western and Far-western) of Nepal.

The selection will be done on a competitive basis from among the eligible CSOs.

## 3. Narrative Progress Report on Program Activities

The program activities carried out during the quarter in question are described below:

## 3.1 Maintenance of Grant Making Structures and Systems

## 3.1.1 Grant Making Committee

Five meetings of the Grant Making Committee (GMC) were organized in connection with the selection of CSOs for grant making for the 4<sup>th</sup> batch (large and small) under MDTF/PFM window<sup>2</sup>.

The first meeting of the quarter in question was held on January 11, 2013; and it had the objective of determining the eligibility of application received for **large grants** for social accountability in **National** PFM. The meeting endorsed the application screening report and decided to forward, for evaluation, the PCNs of the eligible CSOs. Of the 16 PCNs received, 7 were found ineligible while 10 were to be forwarded for evaluation by the GMC. A 3 member sub-committee of GMC for evaluation of PCN of eligible applicants was formed.

The second meeting, held on January 29, 2013 was intended to decide on the result of PCN evaluation and shortlist of the CSOs for inviting for Full Project Proposal (FPP) for large grant for **Naional** PFM. The meeting decided on the shortlist and to invite the shortlisted CSOs to submit the FPPs. The meeting also agreed on the summary of recommendation/feedback to the proponents on their respective PCNs. Besides, the meeting also made some updates and refinements on the evaluation criteria and FPP format.

The third meeting, held on February 20, 2013 was to determine the eligibility of applications received for **small grants** for social accountability in PFM at **Local** level. The meeting endorsed the eligibility screening report and decided to forward, for evaluation, the FPPs of eligible CSOs. Of the 60 applications received, 14 were found ineligible while 46 FPPs were to be forwarded for evaluation by the GMC. Two sub-committees comprising of 3 GMC members each were formed for evaluation of the FPPs.

The fourth and fifth meetings were held in March 2013 mainly to decide on the final results of evaluation of proposals and decide the rank orders of the CSOs for large grants on **National** PFM and **small** grants on **Local** PFM respectively. The summary feedbacks/recommendations for the proponents were also agreed for both categories.

## 3.1.2 Updates and refinements in the Guidelines

Modified Guidelines for Applicants for small grants category, which was finalized through a wide consultative process among PRAN partners, was consented by the PCU in January which was subsequently translated into Nepali language. This progress paved the way for announcing call for proposal for this batch. Likewise, Guidelines for Applicants at Full Project Proposal (FPP) stage for large grants category was prepared and was made available to the CSOs shortlisted for FPP submission. Updates and adjustments

Since this window is being implemented under banner of PRAN, the grants to be made under this window have been assigned the batch no 4, though this is the first under this funding window.

were made particularly on the format for FPP and evaluation criteria in line with the proposed SA initiatives for National PFM,

## 3.1.3 Communications and Publicity

As part of the communication strategy, CECI website for PRAN maintained. Besides, grant making activities were publicized and shared among stakeholders on several occasions, while information about the grant making activities were shared among other grant making agencies/programs.

## 3.2 Grant Making

With respect to progress in grant making, major milestone was accomplished in this quarter with the completion of the process of selection of CSOs by the GMC that was initiated in the previous quarter.

## 3.2.1 Large Grants in National PFM

The process of preliminary screening of applications for national PFM was completed and PCNs of the eligible CSOs were forwarded to the GMC members for evaluation in mid-January. Subsequently, the following process steps were completed, in chronological order, by the end of March:

- · Evaluation of PCNs by the GMC and decision on shortlist of CSOs.
- Invitation of FPPs from the shortlisted CSOs
- Submission FPPs by the short listed CSOs
- Evaluation of FPPs by the GMC and decision on rank order of CSOs based on evaluation of FPPs.

Altogether 16 CSOs had applied of which 7 were shortlisted for FPP stage. Upon evaluation of those 7 FPPs 3 CSOs were selected for negotiation and contract for large grants (Table 1)

Although there was a provision of up to 4 grants in this batch, and 4 CSOs had crossed the pre-determined threshold of scores (see Annex 1) only 3 were recommended by the GMC. The GMC decided not to recommend the fourth, which had a competitive score in FPP evaluation, on grounds of conflict of interest (see section 7).

## 3.2.2 Small Grants in PFM at Local Level

It was only towards the end of December 2012 that training of CSOs on SA tools on PFM was completed by NCDI<sup>3</sup>. The precondition for announcement of call for proposal was fulfilled with the receiving from NCDI the list for target CSOs on the one hand and the consent from TTL on the modified Guidelines (see section 3.1.2 above) in the month of January. Subsequently the call for FPP was announced in mid-January. The proposals for SA in PFM at VDC level were received from the target CSOs in early February while the process of preliminary screening of applications was completed and FPPs of the eligible CSOs were forwarded to the GMC members for evaluation in mid-February. The subsequent process of evaluation of FPPs by the GMC and decision on rank order of CSOs based on evaluation of FPPs, was completed in by end March.

Altogether 60 CSOs had submitted FPPs in this category from among which 30 CSOs were recommended by GMC for negotiation and contract for small grants (Table 2).

Of the 30 CSOs selected 11came from the Western Development Region, 12 came from Mid-western Development Region while 7 came from Far-western development Region. Beltwise, 3 came from Mountains, 12 from Hills while as many as 15 came from the Terai.

## 4. Operations and Program Management

The quarterly progress report for the period Oct — Dec, 2012 along with the financial monitoring report was submitted to the TTL and was approved. Similarly, the withdrawal application was submitted to the World Bank and was approved by the TTL. Subsequently, the application for approved amount was submitted through the *clientconnection*; and the fund received in the Designated Account (DA).

Upon request from the PCU, CECI also prepared the interim progress report for the current quarter (Jan – Mar, 2013) and submitted the same to the PCU for its use even as the complete quarterly report is due on May 15, 2013

In the context of the transition of leadership in the PCU, briefing to the new Coordinator got due attention during this quarter. In addition, CECI, together with other PRAN partners, was actively engaged in the consultative process led by the World Bank on refining the results indicators as well as the designing of next phase of the project for until December 2015 including the Impact Evaluation Framework for MDTF-PFM.

CECI continued to participate and share the progress in the Monthly Meetings of PRAN partners as well as other occasional meetings organized by PCU and/other partners. Likewise, CECI also participated in the 3 day residential Way Forward Workshop organized by PCU in March and made two presentations.

Besides, a revision on the of Procurement Plan was agreed with the TTL (See Annex 3)

## 5. Summary of Financial Reports

The total expenditure during the reporting period is accounted as **US\$23,232.86**. The cash projection for the next quarter is estimated at **US\$ 321,970.00**. The closing balance at the designated account at the end of the reporting period is **US\$215,536.14**. Thus, the net cash requirement for the next quarter amounts to **US\$ 106,433.86**. The details are presented in the Financial Reports (Attachments).

## 6. Priorities for the Next Quarter

The major priority for the next quarter (April – June, 2013) will be to conclude the negotiation process followed by signing the contracts with the successful CSOs, orient the sub-grantees on operations and get them at work. Likewise, monitoring of work at the field will also get going starting next quarter.

## 7. Key Challenges encountered

Some of the key challenges encountered during this quarter have been summarized as follows:

- As a result of the delayed completion of training of CSOs to be targeted for small grants (towards the end of December) together with the concurrence on the modified Guidelines for Applicants the grant making process got little delayed for small grants category. The announcement of call for proposal could take place only in mid-January. Similarly, the process of selection of CSOs for large grants also got little protracted mainly due to the low turnout of applications.
- Despite two rounds of announcement of Call for PCNs only 16 applications were receive for large grants on National PFM. There was a provision of 4 grants and only 7 CSOs were shortlisted for FPP. The process ended up in selecting only 3 CSOs despite the fact that there was a 4<sup>th</sup> competing proposal.
- The low turnout of proposals was further complicated as the 4<sup>th</sup> CSO, whose
  proposal was competitive, was made subject to the test of potential conflict of
  interest. GMC decided that this proposal be rejected, despite its competitive
  score, on grounds of conflict of interest. The remaining Proposals could not cross
  the predetermined minimum threshold of scores. As a result only 3 CSOs were to
  be selected.
- Notably, all the 3 selected CSOs had proposed to work on health sector. The GMC had asked CECI to make sure during negotiation that each of the 3 CSOs work on different sectors.

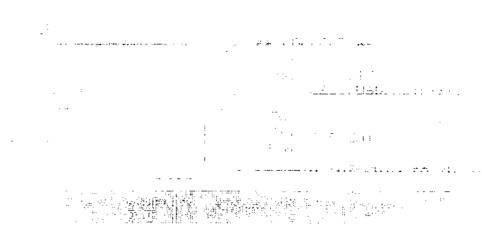
